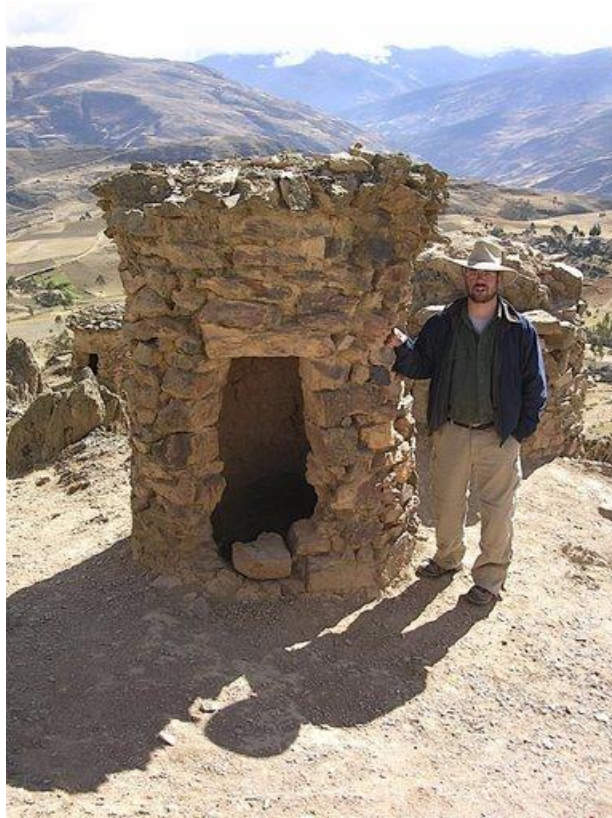

Your Course Participation and Assessments

Learning Communities

Students learn through interactions with each other, with their instructor, and with the course material. To build on this, a major goal of this course is to encourage you to build learning communities within the class. To reach this goal, we will use the discussion area to meet each other and share our thoughts and concerns. This course has special forums to aid in building our learning community.

The "Questions for the Professor" discussion forum is used for general questions about course content, navigation, or flow. Please do not ask personal or specific grade-related questions in this forum, send individual communication instead.

The "Cyber Café" is available to discuss items of interest to you and your classmates. Please remember that in all discussion forums, you must follow all netiquette rules and guidelines.

Each week, you will have individual and/or group activities to complete. You will receive points toward your grade based on your participation in the activities and the quality of your individual or group's work. A brief description of the course activities follows. Detailed information, instructions and rubrics are available online in the Blackboard classroom.

Student Introductory Post

This project is designed to ensure you know how to navigate the course website and search for information online while having a little "fun" at the same time. Begin the exercise by clicking the [Discussions](#) tab in your web browser and selecting the "Student Introductions" thread. Construct approximately a 200-250 word introduction of yourself in which you mention who you are, why you are enrolled in the class, your field of study, and what interests you about cultural anthropology. Feel free to upload a picture of yourself. Do this within the first week of the course for credit.

You will complete **1** introductory post for **40** points toward your final grade

Chapter Board Discussions

As this is an 8-week course, you will participate in approximately four discussions each week. The links to the forums are located in the weekly folders in the "What's Do This Week" Blackboard area.

The discussion board forums are an opportunity to have thoughtful discussions about a given topic. The questions raised will be general in nature and ask you to think deeply. In each discussion forum, you will be required to give a thoughtful and comprehensive response of at least five to eight sentences that are reflective and well-written, as well as respond to at least two other people.

Class members are expected to contribute original thoughts as well as respond to classmates' posts. In your responses, you will ask your classmates questions, expand on one of their ideas, ask for clarity on one of their points, and maybe even politely disagree and explain why.

Please note that you should complete all of the readings for the week prior to posting your discussion board forum response. You are expected to post to the forums in correct sentence and paragraph format. Remember to check for correct spelling and grammar.

Participation in this course is gained through regular participation in the various discussion boards located on the course website in Blackboard. Within each of these sections that pertain to the weekly readings in your book, you will find discussion questions that you must respond to during that week. Failure to do so will result in no points for that week's participation grade. Each chapter's question set has a timed window (deadline) for that particular week, after which it will be locked. After the deadline has passed for a week's questions, you cannot "go back" and respond to the previous discussion questions for credit. A good way to avoid problems in this area is to keep up with your weekly reading assignments. There are two questions pertaining to each of the assigned chapters (16 chapters with 2 questions for each chapter at 5 points each = 160 points). Feel free to reflect upon the questions and revise/repeat your responses by adding to them if you feel you have come across new ideas. As questions are to be answered weekly, they also serve as a weekly attendance check. These are easy points to obtain folks, so please don't forget to answer the questions. In many cases, there are not right or wrong answers and many ask you to relate the material to your own life's experiences so your responses may be specific to you. Chapter Discussion Board Points are tabulated on a weekly basis. As long as you are timely (and thoughtful) in your responses, you can expect credit. Grades for each chapter's discussion board will be posted to the grade book the Wednesday after it is due. Please use the free spell-check/grammar check options in the text box or, for best results, compose your essays offline and cut/paste them into the text edit window of Blackboard.

Here is a sample of a discussion board question we will use in this class:

One of the anthropological topics introduced in this chapter is that of "cultural relativism" which is compared to that of "ethnocentrism." What is the important distinction between these 2 concepts and why are they both so important to the field of anthropology? Please include any "real world" examples of these concepts from your own life's experiences in your discussion.

You will complete 16 discussion boards at 10 points each for a total of 160 points toward your final grade. That is, 2 discussion question responses per chapter at 5 points per response.

Cyber Café Participation

You will note that apart from the chapters, there is a discussion board marked as the "Cyber Cafe." This is a board for all of us to interact together as a learning communities group. Please make at least 10 contributions to this board in order to receive all of the points (10 posts at 5 points each). This space is meant to be an informal place where you can ask questions and interact with other students and myself in the course. I will participate in this board at an equal level as everyone else. Feel free to post questions, observations you wish to share with others, information about things you have seen or read in the news that may be of interest to your instructor and others in the class as long as they are related to course content (i.e. anthropological). In this section you can test your own ideas about something, reflect on your own response as well as that of others, and revise your own ideas as appropriate. Because this board remains open all semester, points will be tabulated in this section at the end of the term and posted to the grade book at that time. Please spell check and use proper grammar/punctuation to receive full credit for your posts. One line responses such as "I agree" or "That's cool" do not count towards a posting. Your posts need to be at least 3-5 sentences to count.

You will complete **10** Cyber Café posts at **5** points each for a total of **50** points toward your final grade.

Tests

There will be (2) 100 question, 200-point exams in this course. Online tests will consist of a combination of multiple choice and/or true/false-type questions and will be administered at the end of weeks four (4) and eight (8) of the course. On exam weeks you will have a window during which you must take and complete your exam (such as 6 am Friday morning until midnight Sunday evening).

All exams for this course will be administered entirely through Blackboard (the Assignment tab) as timed online exams. For each exam, you will have 90 minutes for completion. Exams must be begun and completed within the allotted time period and once an online exam session has been started or initiated by you, you must complete it. You cannot begin an exam and then return to it at a later time, so be mindful of how much time you have left. If you encounter any problems with the online testing system, please contact the FSCJ computing help desk. If you were cut offline and locked out of a test so that you need to have the testing system manually reset, please contact me directly via email as computing personnel and the distance learning office cannot reset an exam reset for you. Only the instructor can do this. In addition, allow the instructor at least 12 hours to respond to an exam request reset.

You will complete **2** tests at **200** points each for a total of **400** points toward your final grade.

Chapter Quizzes

At the conclusion of reading each chapter from your text, you should take a quiz on that chapter. As this is an eight-week course, you are responsible for reading and taking quizzes for two chapters per week. You will find the links for these quizzes through the "Assignments" tab. Quizzes will utilize the mastery learning concept, meaning that you will have unlimited attempts on each quiz for that week in order to maximize your score. Each quiz is composed of 10 multiple choice and true-false random block questions and is presented all-at-once in a timed format. Each quiz allows 10 minutes maximum for completion. Do not go over your time limit. Once a quiz is opened (clicked on), the timer begins for that quiz. You will be penalized 5 points for each minute you go over on a quiz. Quizzes cannot be printed out (though you can review them online before an exam by selecting

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your score within the grade book). Be sure to hit submit before your time is up and allow several seconds for it to register. Do NOT have any additional windows open in your browser or "double click" a link if your computer seems slow to respond. This will result in a lockout and a lost attempt on a quiz. Quiz attempts will not be reset. No two attempts will be identical.

You will complete 16 quizzes at 20 points each for a total of 320 points toward your final grade.

Course Evaluation Completion

In the last couple weeks of the course, you will be provided an opportunity to evaluate the course. Your opportunity will appear as a link within your Connections student account. In addition, you will access a link in the "Assignments" tab of the course to indicate that you have completed the online. Completion will result in a "check mark" in the grade book for you to indicate that this assignment has been completed.

You will complete 1 course evaluation at 30 points each for a total of 30 points toward your final grade.

Extra Credit Opportunity

You may complete up to one (1) online video exercises for extra credit. When you have finished viewing the video, write a short 3 page max. paper about the film and submit through Blackboard's Assignment Tab. Be certain to relate your answers to the course chapter readings in the text. Your submission will be worth up to twenty five (25) points. No more than one submission will be accepted per student. Please be thorough and complete in your answers, including using complete sentences and checking your spelling/grammar before emailing the result. They must follow the same format as a regular social sciences paper would (12-point Times New Roman font, double-spaced, citations referenced in APA style). You cannot wait until the end of the course to submit an extra credit paper. It is due by the end of week 7 (EC Paper). If you have a disability related issue with viewing online content, you may instead choose an article from the course reader (or online PDFs) that we have not covered in the class for the basis of your exercise. The structure will be the same as that posted for a video-based paper.

You may complete 1 paper at up to 25 points for a total of 25 bonus points toward your final grade.

As this is a fully online course, please note that all course deadlines will be strictly followed according to the course syllabus. Late discussion boards and/or work will not be accepted.

Incomplete Grade Policy

To be eligible for an "I" grade, you must be passing the course at the time of the request, and must have completed at least 75 percent of the course work and currently obtaining a passing grade (C or higher) at the time of the request. Your instructor will work with you to complete a contract indicated what work you must complete and a mandatory completion date. If you do not complete the required coursework by the agreed upon deadline, your grade will automatically change to an F. "I" grades are only given under the most extreme circumstances such as an immediate family death (parent, child, sibling) or hospitalization, and with proper documentation only.
